Other Updates

MMA released press statements to the media this month on preventive measures to take to protect against influenza. In our statements we advised the public to practice good hygiene and recommended vaccination especially for the children and the elderly who may be at risk of complications from influenza. We also issued a statement on calling for GPs to be prioritised in the supply of vaccines.

We had also issued a press statement urging the Public Service Department (PSD), Ministry of Health (MOH) and Ministry of Finance (MOF) to once and for all, work together to sort out the issues faced by our Medical Officers (MOs). This after it was reported in the media that several Medical Officers (MO) in Sibu, Sarawak had their contracts abruptly terminated.

These doctors had completed their studies and housemanship training overseas and as such returned to Malaysia to serve under a two year UD41 medical officer contract. During the two years of service, they were not offered a permanent position despite being exemplary medical officers, and having started training for a specialist course. The hospital that they are serving in is also in need of medical officers to maintain their service to the people of Sibu, Sarawak. MMA is pleased to hear that steps are being taken to address this issue and that the Minister of Health will be immediately investigating this matter.
